

The Promise of Christmas

Christmas commemorates the fulfillment of God's first promise to Adam and Eve, our human parents. It is God's remarkable response to the trouble that they had gotten themselves into. Believe God when he says that you can be forgiven of sin by putting your faith and trust in Jesus.

Christmas is the joy filled celebration that the Savior came just as God promised he would.



Old Business

HSVFD Proposal for Incentivize Fire Department Membership and Participation

The HSVFD has presented the board with an incentive program to help recruit volunteers (members & non-members living with the fire district) for the fire department. Historic membership levels at the HSVFD is at an all-time low and they are seeking ways to incentivize members of the community to join and support the fire department. Brian Bagby (414) President of the Volunteer Membership was in attendance. Conversation ensues.

Board Response: Tony Harris will work on the wording for an incentive program rule to be presented to the board .

Boating Rule Revisions

3 changes to the boating rules were proposed by the board.

1. Current Rule

Boating Hours

Boating shall be allowed on Holiday and Su Twan Lakes twenty-four (24) hours a day. Between sunset and sunrise watercraft shall operate at "No Wake" speeds only.

Proposed Rule

Boating shall be allowed on Holiday and Su Twan Lakes twenty-four (24) hours a day. Between sunset and sunrise watercraft shall operate at "No Wake" speeds only with required navigation lights displayed (625 ILCS 45/4-2 and 45/4-8).

2. Current Rule

Swimming Restrictions

Unless accompanied by a watercraft, swimmers and persons using floating devices shall be limited to:




Fig. 2 Black Areas – No Wake

- Restricted Areas (See Figure 2- Restricted Areas)
- A distance not to exceed seventy-five feet from all shorelines unless otherwise posted with a buoy.

- A distance not to exceed seventy-five feet from all shorelines unless otherwise posted with a buoy.
- On the 4th of July during the fireworks show when accompanied by a watercraft.
 - 3. Current Rule

Restricted Areas

No person shall operate any watercraft in a restricted area which has been designated a "No Wake" area, swimming area, or an otherwise restricted area except in the prescribed manner.

- A distance of seventy-five (75) feet from the shoreline shall be considered a "No Wake" area unless otherwise posted with buoys.
- No Wake Water Levels for entire lake:
- When the lake level reaches 9" over full pool the lake shall be made "no wake". There are identifying lake level markers at various locations on the lake which identify these levels. The "no wake" light atop the clubhouse shall also be used to indicate a "no wake" status. (*Ref: Board of Directors Meeting* 7/28/93)
- When the lake level reaches 16" below full the lake shall be made "no wake". There are identifying lake level markers at various locations on the lake which identify these levels. The "no wake" light atop the clubhouse shall also be used to indicate a "no wake" status. (*Ref: Board of Directors Meeting 12/13/00*)

A wake is defined as the movement of water created by a boat underway great enough to disturb a boat at rest, but under no circumstances shall a boat underway exceed five (5) miles per hour while in a NO WAKE area. (625 ILCS 45/5-12)

Capital Credits Q&A

The changing needs of an evolving membership prompted Southwestern Electric Cooperative's board of directors to update the co-op's decades-old approach to returning member capital. Ann Schwarm, board president, explained the policy changes at the co-op's annual meeting in September. If you missed the meeting or our October recap, here's what you need to know.

Q: What are capital credits?

A: Capital credits are your equity in the co-op. They represent your share in the ownership, maintenance, construction and success of Southwestern Electric Cooperative.

The cooperative's rates are designed to bring in enough money to pay operating costs and maintain an emergency reserve. When revenue exceeds expenses, that money is later returned to members as capital credits.

The capital credits assigned to you in a year are based on the cooperative's annual margins — the revenue that exceeded Southwestern's operating costs — and the capital you contributed by paying your electric bills. The more power you use, the more capital credits the co-op assigns to your account.

Q: How does Southwestern use the membership's equity, or investment, in the co-op?

A: Your equity in the co-op is used as operating capital for maintenance and improvements, such as new substations, poles and wire. Those improvements are expected to last 30 years. Southwestern retires, or returns, capital credits to members on a 30-year schedule. The cooperative traditionally has returned capital credits during general retirements and to estates upon the death of a member.

Q: How is your policy for returning member capital changing?

A: Beginning Jan. 1, 2024, you may apply for an adjusted early payout of capital credits if you're terminating your membership or if you're the executor of an estate with capital credits. In the past, Southwestern didn't offer the option of adjusted early payouts.

Q: What prompted the policy change?

A: You did. The board revisited Southwestern's capital credit policy to meet your needs — the needs of a changing membership. You're far more mobile than you were when our policy was originally drafted in 1939. We have members who relocate five times in 10 years, eventually moving off co-op lines. Each change of address is an opportunity to fall out of touch. That can make it difficult to return capital credits to people who've earned them. Recognizing that, Southwestern's board of directors decided to offer an adjusted early payout option to the co-op's capital credit retirement policy.

Q: Why are early payouts adjusted — why don't you pay out in full, as you do with a general retirement?

A: Early payouts recognize that you withdrew your capital credits before Southwestern could realize their full value. The co-op was not able to use those funds as capital for the full 30 years as planned. If you withdraw your capital credits before they fully mature — even if you are settling an estate — they will be adjusted to the net present value.

"Southwestern's board considered the update carefully, over months. We voted unanimously to update the policy in the spirit of fairness. Fairness to people who terminate their membership when they leave our lines and fairness to those of you who have built a life here — members who want to receive safe, reliable power, from a cooperative you invested in and own."

Bourbon Bacon Pecan Pie

- 1 pie dough (9 inches)
- 4 strips thick-cut bacon 1/2 cup dark corn syrup
- 1/2 cup light corn syrup
- 1 cup light brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons unsalted
- butter, melted
- 2 tablespoons bourbon
- 3 large eggs
- 1/2 teaspoon salt 2 1/2 cups raw pecan halves
- Place baking sheet in oven. Preheat





What about mailboxes?

The truck will get as close to the mailboxes as possible. It is the homeowner's responsibility to keep the area in front of the mailbox cleared.

Keep mailboxes closed at all times.

What about trashcans on pick up days?

Trashcans & recycle containers must be 4' off the road.

The snowplow drivers will not get out to move your containers and will not be responsible for damage.

USE CAUTION!!

When maintenance is out on the roads, stay a safe distance behind the trucks.

If you cannot see the mirrors on the trucks, they will not be able to see you.

Firefighter's Footnote - We hope evervone had a very happy Thanksgiving and were able to get together with family and friends. Be safe this holiday season when putting up Christmas lights and decorations. Make sure your ladder is placed solidly on the ground on a non-slippery surface, do not stand on rolling chairs, don't overload your outlets and extension cords, and extinguish candles when you go to bed or leave the house. Only charge your battery operated items (such as trimmers, blowers, mowers, and golf carts) when you are home and never leave them charging overnight or while you are gone. Change the batteries in your smoke alarms and CO detectors if you didn't already do it last month when Daylight Saving Time ended. These detectors should last for ten years but we recommend you change them out af-

ter seven years to make sure that they are in proper working condition. In November we participated in the annual Veteran's Day parade, practiced our Driver's Safety Course and reviewed our Hazmat Refresher Scenarios. This month we will go over Extinguishers, Personal Protective Equipment and do our SCBA (self-contained breathing apparatus) Evolutions. We responded to 20 calls last month: 13 medical, 3 CO detectors, and one each for a structure fire, auto accident, mutual aid for an auto accident, and a lift assist. Proposed Rule Changes in Boating Rules

John Crotty This is related to the proposed rule change and the voting rules around swimming restrictions. The proposal read "Swimmers and persons using floating devices shall be limited to: • Restricted Areas (See Figure 2- Restricted Areas) • A distance not to exceed seventy-five feet from all shorelines unless otherwise posted with a buoy. • On the 4th of July during the fireworks show when accompanied by a watercraft." There has been some discussion on whether there will be some confusion on floating devices. I know it currently says that but should we be more specific on floating devices because technically even a boat is a floating device. Conversation ensues. Jennifer Halverson (1829) I did send in a safety report last week. I did highlight the things that we've accomplished for the year. I think the only open item was the camera at the marina. John Crotty So the Marina has been remodeled this winter and they're going to install cameras and give the office access to those cameras when needed. Jim McCann We had a meeting on Sunday with Cody Gray from IDNR. And we had six people attend the meeting for trainers. One of the pluses of going through IDNR is all the materials are free and provided to us. There is no charge, like there is with the Coast Guard. When we had the Coast Guard come out there was a \$25 charge to every member that went through the class. With IDNR we can't charge for the class because it's all provided by a grant from the state. We're going to have a class in January, so that all of the trainers can be certified in and be moved from a candidate trainer into a trainer at which time we can have our own classes out here on a more regular basis, all we have to do is give the IDNR a 45 day notice to get it done and it will be at no cost. Jennifer Halverson (1829) They teach out of the same book as the Coast Guard and we can modify it and include our rules in an extra chapter at the end. There's just certain topics that we do have to cover. It sounds like they'll send an officer to each class to give some face time and just say you know, this is what happens when there is a stop, they may cover some of the topics. The instructor also encouraged us to do what he called Field Days, which I do like that, but we will need additional volunteers for that. I'm even a little concerned with the limited volunteers that we did get that we can keep up with the classes. It just depends. I mean, if we only do a couple then probably it will be okay. But the Field Days what he was recommending is more hands-on experience. And he said perhaps the IDNR could come to those events. We can show how to back a trailer up, we could show how to dock a boat, kind of give them more of the visual and actually have them tie a boat up to a dock. And just cover different things on the water versus, you know, just reading from a book. Jim McCann I think if we have our own trainers out here, it gives us a better opportunity for new members to actually require them to take these classes before they can get their boats stickers, so that we don't have people going out on the lake who don't know how to drive a boat which right now that happens all the time. Jennifer Halverson (1829) And he did say we could take the test that we give to the kids when they get certified. It's a test that we've written about our rules, and he did say we can add that to the test as kind of an extra handful of questions for them. And I think that would reiterate some of the key rules that apply out to here, which direction do you go and no-wake after certain hours, those sort of things we could highlight and make sure that they comprehended, but the good news is we can be very flexible in how we teach it, we can do it two hours every week for a month. If you're exposed to the flu after receiving the shot, your body can immediately go on the offensive against those germs. You may not stay completely symptom-free, but you're more likely to experience a mild case and be back on your feet quicker.
- Restock the medicine cabinet. The start of cough, cold and flu season is an ideal time to dig through your medicine cabinet. Start by discarding any medications that are out of date and make a list of anything you need to replenish. Be sure to include pain relievers, fever reducers, decongestants, antihistamines and cough syrups to fight symptoms. It's also a good time to restock items like tissues, cough drops, hand sanitizer and anti-bacterial soap.

Treat Symptoms

Although the flu can hit fast, it's often hard to tell at first whether your symptoms are due to a simple cough, cold or a case of the flu. Either way, managing symptoms like a cough can bring relief and help you keep comfortable and get plenty of rest.

- Give your body time to heal. Sleep plays an important role in your overall health, especially when you're under the weather. On average, you need 7-9 hours each night to give your body enough time to fully recharge. When you're sick, you likely need even more, and it's a good idea to dial back your activity level, too. Pushing your physical limits often only delays your recovery time.
- Take medications as directed. Nagging symptoms can often keep you from getting the sleep you need. One way to give your body the break it needs is to effectively manage symptoms. A hacking cough is a common symptom that can be painful and disrupt your sleep. Consider an option like Mucinex DM 12-Hour, a cough suppresent which relieves chest congestion and thins and loosens mucus, giving you an extended reprieve. It's clinically proven to last up to 12 hours, provides relief for chest congestion and makes coughs more productive.

Prevent Spread

Getting sick may be beyond your complete control, but you can take steps to protect others from germs when you're feeling ill.

■ Keep germs to yourself. Washing your hands often, covering your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze and sneezing into your elbow if you don't have a tissue are simple ways you can limit the spread of germs, especially within your home or workspace. Frequently wiping down high-touch surfaces can also help

reduce the spread of germs.

■ Skip socializing. If you're feeling under the weather, stav home. Even a mild cold can easily spread, and an illness that affects you mildly could cause significant distress for someone else. Avoid unnecessary errands and take advantage of services like curbside pickup if you must get out. Also check with your employer about working remotely if you're up to it.



COLD VS. FLU

There's a lot of overlap between cold and flu symptoms, so it can be tricky to figure out whether the bug you're fighting is a cold or influenza and how to tackle it.

While both the common cold and the flu are respiratory illnesses, they are not caused by the same viruses. Although colds are inconvenient, they are far less likely to develop into anything more serious, as the flu can.

What is a Cold?

Generally, colds are milder than the flu, and more likely to cause runny or stuffy noses (while the flu can cause stuffy or runny noses, it's less likely to do so). You won't feel good, but you'll probably be able to do some or all of your daily tasks. The flu typically hits harder, making it difficult to go to work or follow your usual routine.

What is the Flu?

The flu often feels worse than a cold; you might experience the same symptoms but amplified. The flu comes with more pain and fever than a cold. Common flu symptoms include sore throat, chills, fever, runny or stuffy nose, muscle fatigue or

aches and headaches. The flu can also develop into more serious conditions and complications, making it more dangerous than the average cold. While the common cold is rarely serious, the flu can be dangerous for young children, the elderly, pregnant women and people with compromised immune systems.

Treating a Cold vs. Flu

You can be vaccinated against the flu. There is no such vaccine for common colds. If your provider recommends it, getting the flu vaccine each year can go a long way toward preventing sickness.

Whether you have a cold or the flu, symptom relief is largely the same. Get plenty of rest, drink plenty of fluids and take over-the-counter medicines to relieve symptoms. Stay home to avoid spreading sickness. Wash your hands frequently and cover your mouth when you cough or sneeze.

Watch for shortness of breath, chest or abdomen pain, confusion, sudden dizziness, severe or persistent vomiting and flu symptoms that improve then return with fever and worse cough. If you experience any of these symptoms, consult a doctor.
