

2024 DECALS

As soon as your 2024 Dues & Assessments are paid in full you can come into the office & pick up your 2024 decals.
2023 decals expire April 30, 2024.

Lot numbers and decals need to be present on ALL watercraft and slow moving vehicles.

This includes all non-motorized watercraft (kayaks, canoes, paddle-boards & paddle-boats). You must bring your current watercraft registration and proof of \$300,000 liability insurance on the watercraft to receive your motorized watercraft decal.

Non-highway Vehicle decals are \$15 annually.

The state requires driver to have a valid driver's license and proof of minimum liability insurance coverage be carried within the vehicle.

Smoky Chorizo and Chicken Pozole

Prep time: 5 minutes Cook time: 30 minutes Servings: 6-8

- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- large white or yellow onion, finely chopped
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt, plus additional, to taste (optional)
- package (9 ounces) Cacique Pork Chorizo
- 2 teaspoons smoked paprika
- 1 teaspoon dried Mexican oregano
- 1 container (16 ounces) Cacique Medium Homestyle Salsa
- quart chicken stock
- 2 pounds boneless, skinless chicken thighs or breasts, trimmed of excess fat and diced
- 1 can (25 ounces) white hominy, drained and rinsed
- lime, cut into wedges
- 3/4 cup crumbled Cacique Ranchero **Queso Fresco**
- 1/2 cup chopped cilantro

In large, heavy pot over medium heat, heat oil. Reserve 1/4 cup onion for garnish; add remaining onion to pot and season with salt. Saute until translucent,

Increase heat to medium-high; add pork chorizo and break it apart with spoon. Cook chorizo undisturbed until deeply browned and cooked through, 3-5 minutes. Add smoked paprika and oregano; cook 30 seconds, or until fragrant.

Pour in salsa and scrape up browned bits from bottom of pan. Bring to simmer 1-2 minutes, allowing it to thicken slightly then add stock and bring to simmer.

Stir in diced chicken and hominy. Decrease heat to medium and cook 8-10 minutes until chicken is cooked through. Taste and season with more salt, if necessary. Remove from heat.

Serve bowls of pozole with reserved onion, lime wedges, crumbled queso fresco and chopped cilantro.



Mexican Loaded Mashed Potatoes

Prep time: 35 minutes Cook time: 40 minutes Servings: 10

- 3 pounds russet potatoes (about 9 medium potatoes), peeled and cubed water
- 6 bacon strips, chopped package Cacique Pork Chorizo
- 12 ounces Cacique Crema Mexicana
- 1/2 cup butter, cubed
- 1 1/2 teaspoons onion powder

- 1 teaspoon salt
- teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper

In Dutch over, add potatoes and cover with water. Bring to boil. Reduce heat; cook, uncovered, 10-15 minutes, or until tender.

In skillet over medium heat, cook bacon until crisp. Drain on paper towels, chop into small pieces and set aside. Remove bacon

grease from skillet and cook chorizo over medium-high heat, 6-8 minutes.

Drain potatoes; add to pan. Mash potatoes, gradually adding crema Mexicana, butter, onion powder, salt, garlic powder and pepper. Transfer to greased 13-by-9-inch baking dish; sprinkle with cheese, chorizo and bacon. Refrigerate, covered, up to 1 day.

Preheat oven to 350 F. Remove potatoes from refrigerator and let stand while oven heats. Bake, covered, about 30 minutes. Uncover; bake 10 minutes, or until heated through.

Drizzle with crema Mexicana agria and chopped green onions.

Boating Rule Revisions

3 changes to the boating rules were proposed, motioned and seconded by the board at the October 11, 2023 Board of Director's meeting. Conversation ensues over the wording of the "Swimming Restrictions" rule.

1. Current Rule

Boating Hours

Boating shall be allowed on Holiday and Su Twan Lakes twenty-four (24) hours a day. Between sunset and sunrise watercraft shall operate at "No Wake" speeds only.

Proposed Rule

Boating Hours

Boating shall be allowed on Holiday and Su Twan Lakes twenty-four (24) hours a day. Between sunset and sunrise watercraft shall operate at "No Wake" speeds only with required navigation lights displayed (625 ILCS 45/4-2 and 45/4-8).

2. Current Rule

Swimming Restrictions

Unless accompanied by a watercraft, swimmers and persons using floating devices shall be limited to:

- Restricted Areas (See Figure 2- Restricted Areas)
- A distance not to exceed seventy-five feet from all shorelines unless otherwise posted with a buoy.

Swimming Restrictions

Swimmers and persons using floating devices (except muscular powered watercraft) shall be limited to:

- Restricted Areas (See Figure 2- Restricted Areas)
- A distance not to exceed seventy-five feet from all shorelines unless otherwise posted with a buoy.
- Usage of unrestricted areas on the 4th of July during the fireworks show when accompanied by a watercraft.



HSVFD Proposal for Incentivize Fire Department Membership and Participation

Members Bob Wheeler (1934), Jerry Theodore (3046) and Dave Decker (1184) were in attendance and conversation ensued.







What caution should I be aware of?

Do not park on the road during the snow removal process. Do not push snow on to the roadway, this creates a very hazardous condition.

What about driveways?

Maintenance personnel are not authorized to plow driveways & plows will not be lifted at the entrance to each individual driveway. Clearance of driveway entrances is the responsibility of the resident. Plows may make several passes in order to widen the roads.

What about mailboxes?

The truck will get as close to the mailboxes as possible. It is the homeowner's responsibility to keep the area in front of the mailbox cleared.

Keep mailboxes closed at all times.

What about trashcans on pick up days?

Trashcans & recycle containers must be 4' off the road.

The snowplow drivers will not get out to move your containers and will not be responsible for damage.

USE CAUTION!!

When maintenance is out on the roads, stay a safe distance behind the trucks.

If you cannot see the mirrors on the trucks, they will not be able to see you.

Firefighter's Footnote

Firefighter's Footnote - We hope your 2024 is off to a good start. HSFD is busy already with our yearly training. In January, we reviewed Reports and Documentation/Communication along with our Medical Training Advanced Intervention Practicals. In February, we will practice Driver's Safety/Scenario Planning and have our annual Ice Rescue Training at our lake along with other nearby fire departments. 2023 was our busiest year so far. We responded to 243 calls with the following breakdown into 23 incident types: 148 EMS calls; 18 Assist an invalid; 9 Dispatched and cancelled en route; 8 MVA (motor vehicle accident) w/o injuries; 8 CO detector activations; 7 Building fires; 6 MVA with injuries; 6 False alarm/ calls; 5 Brush/Grass fires; 5 Downed power lines; 4 No incident found on arrival; 4 Smoke detector activations-no fire; 4 Gas leaks; 2 Structure fires other than a building; and 1 each for Cooking fire confined to container, Car fire, Road/transport vehicle fire, Off-road/ heavy equipment fire, Heat from wiring short circuit, Cover/standby/move-up mutual aid, Good intent call, Malfunction of alarm system, and Detector activation - no fire (9 calls).

Our number of volunteers at HSFD fluctuates each year but our present roster consists of 22 full members, 2 candidates, and 6 auxiliary personnel. We would like to have as many volunteers as possible to respond to our many calls, so consider helping your family, neighbor and community by joining the Holi-

day Shores Volunteer Fire Department. You can come by every Monday evening between 7 and 9pm to see us in person where we can answer any questions you may have. You do not need previous experience. A lot of our members had no prior training and have learned their skills at the department. Follow us on Facebook or check out our website at www.hsfd.org.

Medic Minute - Did you know that most smoke alarms have a lifespan of 8-10 years, while CO (carbon monoxide) detectors last between 5 and 7 years? A hard-wired smoke alarm or one with a lithium battery can last up to 10 years, at which time you should just replace the whole unit; although, it's better to replace them after eight years before any issues occur. It is recommended to replace your CO detector every 5 years because their ability to detect carbon monoxide is questionable after that. According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), three of every five home fire deaths happened in homes without smoke alarms or with non-functioning ones. Carbon monoxide is equally, if not more, dangerous. The CDC reports that over 400 Americans die from CO poisoning each year, causing more than 20,000 visits to the emergency room, with more than 4,000 hospitalized. More often than not, the malfunctioning units are due to missing, disconnected, or dead batteries. Make sure to replace your batteries regularly!! Test your smoke detectors monthly and change them at least once a year - every New Year's Day as an exam-



ple. CO detector batteries need to be replaced every six months, so changing them during the start and end of daylight savings time is a great way to remember. Install smoke detectors on every floor of your house including basements, in each bedroom and outside of each bedroom area. Put CO detectors on every floor as well and near, but not inside, an attached garage. Keep CO detectors out of direct sunlight, at least five feet away from appliances, and 20 feet away from any fuel-burning heat source. Avoid high-humidity areas, extreme heat or cold, and blowing air vents, returns and even ceiling fans. Remember, smoke alarms and CO detectors are not to be ignored. Don't just think of them when you hear the low battery chirp. They save lives!

HSFD wants you! If you already have medical or firefighting skills, we can use you. If you don't, we can teach you all the necessary skills that you would need to respond to an emergency. We have classes, on-line learning, training, and practicals to help you achieve the level that you feel comfortable with. Volunteers on our department include students, lay-people of all professions, medical personnel (nurses, nurse practitioners), first responders (EMTs and paramedics), those with full-time jobs, and retirees. We also have an auxiliary level for those who wish to help out but do not want to be hands-on. If you want to help others, there is something available for everyone. Consider joining HSVFD – odd hours, poor pay and cool hats available!
