

Manager's Report by Angie Webster



As many of you are aware. The culvert pipe towards the north end of the lake between Biscay Drive and Wakiki, buckled and created a sinkhole in the roadway. This repair has been scheduled and will be completed as soon as possible.

Main beach repairs have been completed. Over 15 tons of sand and 1" rock have been brought to fill in low spots and holes. The ramp to the swimming area has been dug out which was full of sand and mud. Rip rap was added to spots on the seawall this should prevent further wash out.

Cedar Beach also had 15 tons of sand brought into the beach and playground areas. The swing set will be getting sanded and painted soon.

I am happy to see the baseball field being utilized again. T-ball seems to be a huge hit. Kick ball to start later in the month. We have plans in the future to add some dugout benches and repair all the fencing along the creek side of the field. In the spring of 2024 new grass seed will be put down to get the weeds out of the outfield. This field is a first come first serve basis at this time.

Properties in disrepair, overgrown and unmaintained are being addressed with the help of Madison County Building and Zoning. As boating season winds down, we will be out in the community more looking into these properties and letters will be sent requesting members to cleanup.

I would like to thank the Board for the opportunity to continue to serve the community as Lake Manager. I hope to make the community proud.





Firefighter's Footnote

Firefighter's Footnote - Fall has officially arrived and it's time for leaf burning. Please be safe and remember these simple rules: burn leaves or other items in a designated burn pit or safe area away from debris or low hanging limbs, never leave a fire unattended, always have a hose nearby, and don't burn on windy days. It's getting darker earlier in the evening and staying dark later in the morning so watch for kids on their way to or from the bus stop. Halloween will be here soon so make sure your ghosts and goblins are watching out for traffic, and are wearing glow sticks, lights or reflective wear that are visible to any drivers on the road. Thank you to all who attended our 9/11 sunrise and sunset ceremonies. We pledged to never forget our 343 FDNY fallen firefighters when we received and installed the beam from one of the World Trade Towers. Last month we tried out our new battery operated extrication equipment. We hope to never have to use them but are glad to have it just in case. In September we got the chance to check out an ambulance, did our Truck Familiarization and Hands-On

Pumping, and had Practicals with Advanced Medical Interventions. Next month we will go over Fireground Management and Burn Preparation and possibly practice our skills with a live fire. Over the previous month we responded to 19 calls: 14 medical, 2 lift assists, and one each for mutual aid for a fire, no incident found, and fire alarm activation. We have added several new auxiliary members to our department recently along with a paramedic. Anyone wanting more information about what we do at Holiday Shores Fire Department can stop by any Monday evening

Medic Minute - It's time to get your yearly flu shot. The CDC estimates that between October 1, 2022 and April 30, 2023 in the U.S., there have been 27-54 million cases of the flu, 12-26 million medical visits, 300,000-650,000 hospitalizations, and 19,000-58,000 deaths caused by the flu. The flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by the influenza virus that infects the nose, throat and sometimes the lungs causing mild to severe illness which can lead to death. The flu viruses spread mainly by tiny droplets



when people with the flu then cough, sneeze, or talk, which can land in the mouths or noses of those nearby. Less often, a person might get it by touching a surface or object that has the flu virus on it and then touch their mouth, nose, or eyes. The best way to prevent flu is by getting a flu vaccine each year.

HSFD wants you! If you already have medical or firefighting skills, we can use you. If you don't, we can teach you all the necessary skills that you would need to respond to an emergency. We have classes, on-line learning, training, and practicals to help you achieve the level that you feel comfortable with. Volunteers on our department include students, lay-people of all professions, medical personnel (nurses, nurse practitioners), first responders (EMTs and paramedics), those with full-time jobs, and retirees. We also have an auxiliary level for those who wish to help out but do not want to be hands-on. If you want to help others, there is something available for everyone. Consider joining HSFD – odd hours, poor pay and cool hats available!

PROPOSED

Non-Highway Vehicles

Non-highway vehicles as defined by <u>Illinois statue 625 ILCS5/11-1426.1</u> with valid Holishor decals and lot numbers will be allowed on Holiday Shores roads where the posted speed limit is 35 miles per hour or less. Operators and the non-highway vehicles must meet the current requirements and any future amended by the state as set out in accordance with IL statue (625 ILCS 5/11-1426.1).

Holishor decals for the non-highway vehicles must be purchased in the Holishor Office for \$15 annually.

LEVEL 1 INFRACTION: Penalty \$50

 The Holishor member is responsible for the actions of any person within/on the

member's non-highway vehicle at all times. No guest may operate a non-highway vehicle unless they are accompanied by a member or have a valid Associate

Member Pass.

Holishor decals and lot numbers must be affixed to the right & left sides of the

vehicle. Lot numbers shall be at least 3 inches in height and a contrasting color to the vehicle.

- 3. Minimum liability insurance must be carried on the vehicle.
- 4. Vehicle operators must have a valid driver's license.

LEVEL 2 INFRACTION: Penalty \$100

- Careless or Reckless Operation. No person shall operate a non-highway vehicle in a careless or heedless manner to endanger any person or property or cause damage to any Holishor property.
- Failure to provide minimum safety equipment as listed in Illinois statue 625 ILCS5/11-1426.1.
- 3. Repeated violation of Level 1 infraction.

LEVEL 3 INFRACTION: Penalty \$200

1. Repeated violation on Level 2 infractions.

 - o Board Update:

Street Safety

- Golf carts without stickers / lot # continue to be seen within the community. Members continue to share concerns with underage drivers.
- There was also a report of minors removing mail from mailboxes on a tan ATV. This same ATV was seen by a member flipped with the driver hitting their head.
- On August 7, several members reported Aptive Environment soliciting within the neighborhood. Members asked them to leave and Madison county was called. The salesmen refused to leave and advised that they were only approaching existing clients. I collected evidence that one salesmen approached a potential new client seeking services. I confirmed with that member that they were not an existing client. Madison County was called again confirming the evidence and asked for them to be escorted off the property. I also emailed Ryan Lucus, VP of Operations for the company and he asked Kevin the STL mgr to contact me. I did speak with Kevin on August 10 and he confirmed that Holiday Shores has been blacked out as potential new clients. I have his personal cell number should we see them out here again selling.
- This is the 3rd pest control company within the last 2 years that have been confirmed to have deceptive selling practices. Members should continue to raise concerns and be firm that we have no trespassing and no solicitation signs at the entrance that service as first warnings. Police officers cannot grant permission for them to be on site. This is a lie that they are telling members. If the office ever approves any solicitation, I will post it to the page. Otherwise, members should call Maidson County and report the trespasser and continue to update the FB page.
- With school back in session, motorists are advised to slow down and watch for children walking to and from bus stops.
- Reminder to also keep the roads clear in front or your homes so first responders can access your property in the event of an emergency.

Boater Safety

- Locking up the marina gate and repair of the chain continues to be a problem. At the Committee meeting last week, we discussed with Angie to add an agenda item for our January meeting to form volunteers to monitor the marina gate Friday – Sunday.
- I am working with IDNR to schedule the classes for our volunteers. We did have a couple of volunteers drop, so if anyone else is interested please reach out.
- Recommendation from a member to put a "presentation" together of key boating rules. Since I have most of that content posted on the page, I have solicited Kyle Shive to help package it and put voice over. This can be posted to the FB page. Once complete, we can then discuss placing a device at the office for new members to review when picking up stickers. The target is ~5 minutes.
- A group of volunteers, including members of the Boat Committee assessed the coves and 75 ft buoys. I have sent the recommended changes to Angie any variances can be brought forward for board approval to change. This information does feed into the list of No Wake areas in both the HOA documentation and the Boating Rules.
- I also reviewed the recommended boating rule changes with Ben Kelly and advised that I didn't think any of these needed to be reviewed with the Boating Committee. He had one recommended adjustment to the PWC language. I have submitted these revisions to the board for consideration. These changes bring the language in alignment with federal law, our HOA guidelines, and current practices.

Vote - Proposed Celebration Sign Rule Addition

A first & second was motioned on July 12, 2023. The proposed rule reads (Birthday or anniversary signs may be displayed no more than 1 week prior to the event and must be taken down no later than 3 days after the event.)

Placement may also include near the back door of the property, in or near the landscaping. Limit of no more than two (2) yard signs per house. Security window decals from an established security company, visible from the outside windows, are acceptable. Security signs other than those listed above will require a variance request from the Board of Directors.)

Annual Fishing Meeting Report

Shaun Diltz We had our annual fishing meeting report July 18, 2023, we had about eight members show up to talk. We have a new state biologist that's working with us Eric Radcliffe, he'll be here next year for it. We didn't get a shocking this year but we on the schedule for next May to shock the main lake and Su Twan. We have \$16,200 from the Association, the Tiki Bar Bass Club is donating \$2,500 for stocking this year. We held back \$2,000 for shipping. We essentially discussed what we're going to throw in the lake, \$4,000 in stripers, hybrid and purebreds. \$500 of that came from the crappy tournament, \$10,000 in bass. We are going to throw some bass in Su Twan and the north ponds, \$1,000 in blue catfish for the main lake. \$1,000 in channel, which most of that is going to go to Su Twan, \$1,000 in red ear sunfish, and we're going to split that up between the three North ponds, Su Twan and the main lake. We discussed how the tournaments were going. The average fish this year was 2.71 pounds in the tournaments. Lots of 2.5 to 3.5 pound bass are caught in the tournaments. Not a lot the big ones. 

Both walls were falling down and were hazardous for members who worked at the gate gardens. Thanks to the Holiday Shores Board who shared the cost of the wall repair with the garden club.

OCTOBER GARDEN TIPS

Perennials, especially spring bloomers can be divided now. Be sure to enrich the soil with compost before replanting. Don't plant peonies too deep and they like a sunny spot.

This is a great time to aerate your lawn and top dress with compost. Your lawn and trees will both benefit.

Begin readying houseplants for winter indoors. Prune back growth and protruding roots. Check for pests and treat if necessary. Houseplants should be brought in at least a month before the heat is turned on.

It is normal for pines and other conifers to lose inner needles at this time of year. Now is a good time to plant new evergreens.

Your yard and garden still need attention in the fall to be ready for the winter. Clean up and mulching are important for healthy plants next year.
