There are four types of decals: motorized, non-motorized (kayaks, paddle-boards, canoes etc), PWC’s and non-highway vehicles (golf carts, side-by-sides etc.) Non-highway vehicles decals are \$15.00. 2025 decals expired on April 30, 2026. Watercraft in the water or on lifts are required to have 2026 decals by May 1.

Associate member cards expired December 31, 2025.

# Manager's Report by Angie Webster



Currently our lake is full pool. I would like to remind all those utilizing the boat ramp at the Marina to please lock it after putting your watercraft in or taking it out of the lake. Keys are available in the office for \$3.00. We repaired the gate 3 times in the month of April and are currently having more locks made because someone cut the lock again.

2025 boat stickers expired April 30<sup>th</sup>. Boats that have expired stickers (Holishor or State) that are in operation, tied to a dock or on a lift will be getting citations. Lot number and state numbers are also required on your boat.

With the cooler weather we are waiting on the plants to start producing hot patch. Once that happens, we will be out patching potholes and doing some road work. We will be starting with the roads on this year's road plan and moving to the remainder as quickly as possible. We have several things that are in the bidding process. We have the rebuild project on SuTwan and Waikiki and normal chip and seal of approx. 22,500 feet of roads. We have some partial asphalt and/or concrete bids coming for Waikiki and Fountainbleu cul de sacs, and some culvert bids coming in. We have gotten a couple of bids in and are waiting on the remainder, which we hope to have for the board first meeting in June. Please exercise caution when you see our crews working and be patient if delayed. They are doing their best not to disrupt normal flow of traffic and still accomplish the task of repairing our roadways. We have several major roadway projects to be completed this year that will probably result in those roads being closed for a small period of time. We will keep you posted on our Website, safety page and Facebook page. Grass is growing at an alarming rate, and we have several members that have very tall grass on lots and yards. In addition to the grass, I have seen a lot of yard debris (mattresses, old building supplies, tires, and trash). Now that the weather has cleared up, let's work to get these issues taken care of. I also want to discourage people from throwing their branches and yard waste on empty lots that do not belong to you. Please refrain from blowing your grass clippings into the roadway.

As we start to transition into the summer months and as the weather starts to warm up the water keep in mind the largemouth bass are in a post spawn and looking to feed. After the spawn the bass are usually skinny, and this is a reminder to take care of the fish due to the stress of the spawn. Make sure to have some g-juice or rejuvenate to put in with your water to help the fish in live wells. Also, as boating season really starts to ramp up, be careful out on the water and watch out for jet skis and skiers. This is also a good time to go through your boat and make sure your boat is fully equipped with the following: life jackets for people you have on the boat, fire extinguisher, throw preserver, whistle, and make sure your batteries have plastic or rubber covers protecting the terminals. I would also like to mention that we still have tickets remaining for our fundraiser to help with fish stocking and if you would like to help the fishing committee out contact Brian Wood, Matt Ressler, Carl Dixon, John Kline or Jason Lowry to purchase tickets. Thank you to everyone that has helped in purchasing tickets already and once all of the 500 tickets are sold we will update social media and we will do a live drawing.

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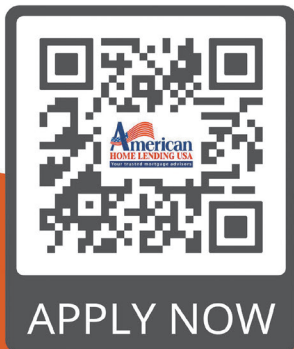

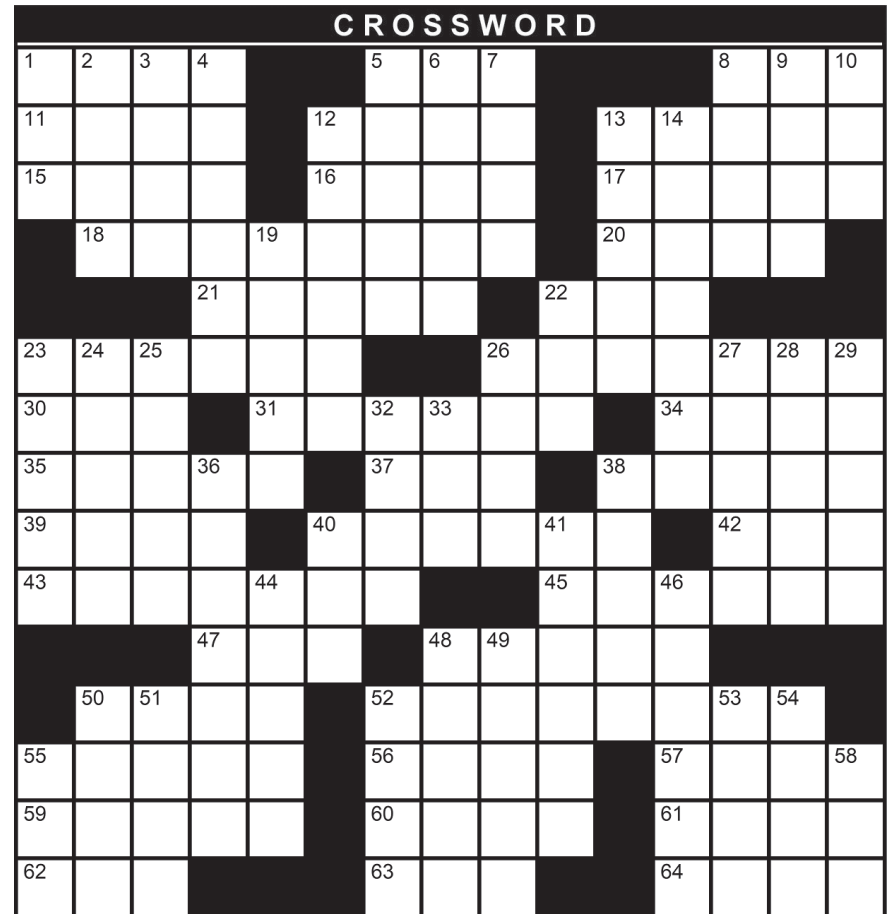

## Medic Minute

Summer Safety (Annual Review)

Summertime is when everybody enjoys themselves outdoors. Here are some tips to keep yourself safe.

**Sunburn** - To prevent sunburn, avoid being in the sun between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. Use a sunscreen with a SPF of at least 15 or higher (preferably 30 or higher), that offers both UVA and UVB protection, and has the active ingredient PABA (unless you are allergic to it). Apply 15-30 minutes before exposure and re-apply every two hours, even if it's waterproof. Note: a minimal amount

of sunshine on the skin is needed to produce Vitamin D, which along with calcium are needed to strengthen bones and prevent osteoporosis.

**Heat Exhaustion/Heat Stroke** - Heat exhaustion occurs when your body can't sweat enough to cool you off, with symptoms of fatigue, weakness, dizziness, nausea/vomiting and skin that's cool, clammy, pale or flushed. Make sure you wear lightweight and light-colored clothing, and take frequent breaks if working outdoors. Treatment includes drinking lots of cool water, getting out of the sun to a cool spot, and sponging your body with cool water. Heat exhaustion can sometimes lead to heat stroke, which happens when your body stops sweating but your core temperature continues to rise, often to 105 degrees or higher. This requires emergency treatment. Symptoms are confusion, delirium or unconsciousness, and skin that's hot, dry, reddened or flushed - even under the armpits. Call 911 immediately.

**Bug Safety** - Summer is the time for mosquitos and there is a rise in mosquito borne illnesses: West Nile virus, Dengue fever, and depending on where you live, Yellow fever, Malaria and Eastern equine encephalitis. To help prevent exposure: use insect repellent with DEET, wear long sleeves and pants, close windows, empty any areas of free-standing water, and use EPA approved indoor and outdoor insect sprays or foggers.

Ticks can carry disease - the most widely known is Lyme disease along with other tick-borne-diseases such as Rocky Mountain spotted fever, which are rising dramatically due to climate change. Ticks become infected after feeding off hosts with the bacteria, such as deer, mice and squirrels, and then transmitting it to humans. Symptoms include: a "bulls-eye" rash, fever, nausea/vomiting, palpitations, or joint pain and swelling. No test presently exists to identify tick bites or the type of tick. For removal of a tick: wear gloves, use forceps or tweezers to grab the tick at skin level without crushing it, gently pull until free - don't twist or turn, it may leave



a piece in the skin. You can also put liquid soap onto a cotton ball and cover it for about 15-20 minutes, which may cause it to release itself. Place the tick into a sealable jar or plastic bag and take it to your doctor if you develop symptoms, who will then prescribe treatment with an antibiotic.

**Poisonous Plants** - Poison Ivy grows as a vine or shrub in the grass or on trees; Poison Oak grows only as a shrub, usually in the western U.S.; Poison Sumac is a tall shrub or small tree found in wooded areas of the eastern states. The rashes are caused by their oils and aren't contagious. Once the skin has been washed and clothing removed, it can't spread. Once exposed, you have about 10 minutes to wash away the oil or a rash may develop within 12 hours. You can use a topical hydrocortisone cream and an oral antihistamine for itching. If the eyes or a large area of rash is involved, contact your doctor.

## Source of Drinking Water

As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.

- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.

- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. 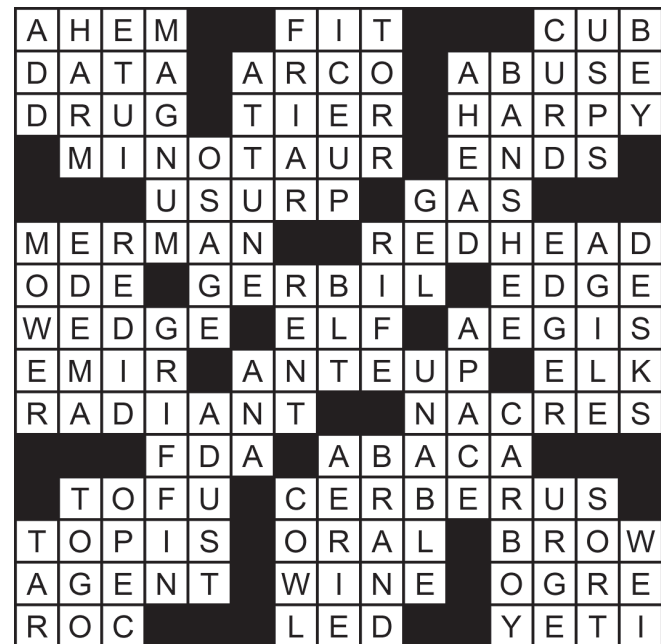

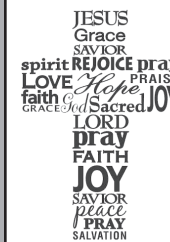
